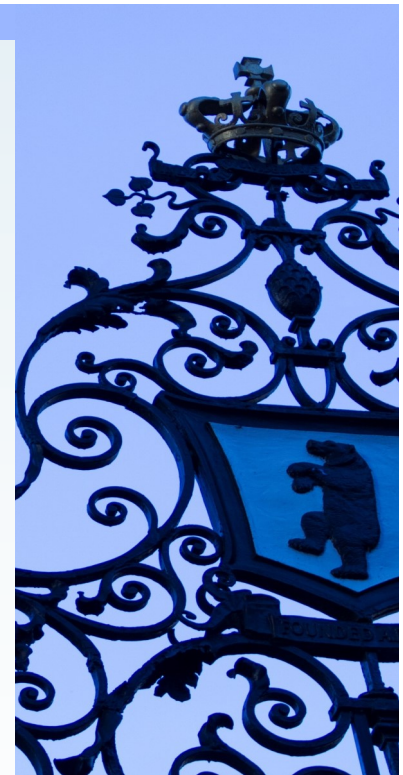

## Featured Funder

### The Guggenheims

The many children and grandchildren of Meyer Guggenheim and Barbara Meyers, who fell in love on a ship as they crossed the Atlantic to the United States from Switzerland in 1847,<sup>1</sup> would come to make up one of the most well-known philanthropic families in the country—after becoming one of the richest.<sup>2</sup> Here’s how the family fortunes, gained primarily from mining and smelting, relate to you.

As perhaps the most prestigious and well known of the various Guggenheim funding sources, **Guggenheim Fellowships** are, I’m sure, not news to you. The [John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation](#) awards were established in 1925 by Meyer and Barbara’s eighth child, Simon Guggenheim, and Simon’s wife, Olga Hirsch, to honor the memory of their first son, who died at the age of 17. The Foundation grants approximately 175 fellowships per year to “further the development of scholars and artists by assisting them to engage in research in any field of knowledge and creation in any of the arts, under the freest possible conditions and irrespective of race, color, or creed.” They “are intended for individuals who have already demonstrated exceptional capacity for productive scholarship or exceptional creative ability in the arts.” Last year, the application success rate was approximately 18%, lower than the average for the NSF and NIH, but higher than for the NEH. More than ten Barnard faculty have received the Fellowship since 2003. For 2020, [applications](#) will become available on the Foundation website in July and will be due, most likely, sometime in mid-September.

Another of Meyer and Barbara’s grandsons, **Harry Frank Guggenheim**, incorporated the [Harry Frank Guggenheim Foundation](#) in 1929. It sponsors research projects on “problems of violence, aggression, and dominance” for both established scholars and graduate students in fields as diverse as genetics, criminology, and humanities. Research priorities include Youth, Family, Media, Crime, Biology, War & Peace, Terrorism, and Religion, Ethnicity, Nationalism. [Applications](#) are due annually on August 1.

Apart from these two important potential sources of funding to support your work, you may also have enjoyed Guggenheim largess if you visited one of the many Guggenheim museums around the world—The [Guggenheim Museum](#) in New York established in 1939 by Solomon, Meyer’s fourth son; and in Venice, where Peggy, Meyer’s granddaughter, opened her collection to the public seasonally beginning in 1951.<sup>3</sup> The Guggenheim in Bilbao, Spain, was funded by the Basque government, so it cannot technically be counted as a beneficiary of family wealth, but it is managed by the Solomon R. Guggenheim Foundation.<sup>4</sup>

More tangentially, Daniel, the second son, created a fund for the promotion of aeronautics in 1926—long since defunct—which helped to establish air travel in the U.S. The American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics continues to award the [Daniel Guggenheim Medal](#) for notable achievements in the field. Because of major gifts from various family members, you can visit Guggenheim Halls in places as far flung as the Colorado School of Mines, the University of Washington, and Bronx Community College. To bring our story full circle, the [Harry Frank Guggenheim Hall of Minerals](#) in the American Museum of Natural History housed a collection of gems and minerals, and, until it closed for renovation, it was one of the most popular gathering places for the many children and grandchildren of New York’s Upper West Side stroller set.

## Sage Advice for Competitive Proposals

### Biosketches

Some proposals and fellowship applications, most notably for federal funders such as the NIH and NSF, require biographical sketches from senior or key applicant as part of the application materials. Guidelines usually limit the length to anywhere from one to five pages. Applicants should think of those pages as an opportunity to “describe why they are well-suited for their role in the project,” to quote the NIH’s explanation. As such, biosketches can become pivotal to drawing a broader picture of the trajectory of your work, its relationship to the funder’s mission, and how your current project fits.

Funders often, but not always, provide precise instructions for biosketch contents. For example, the NIH biosketch must follow a specific [template](#) and include, beyond your name, title, and education:

- A. Personal statement
- B. Positions and Honors
- C. Contributions to Science
- D. Additional Information: Research Support and/or Scholastic Performance

The NIH biosketch may also include a link to a full list of the applicant’s published work, but no tables or graphics.

So, how can you make the most of these “extra” pages?

#### Tips for All Biosketches (maybe even Words to Live By)

- Read the instructions, download the most recent template, and adhere to them (or it) religiously. Deviations can sometimes disqualify your application out of hand. We do not want your excellent research to go unfunded because of fudged margins or the wrong font.
- Use headers and subheads, bolds and underlines, to separate sections and help your readers pick up the most important parts as they skim...because I hate to admit it, but they may skim.
- Focus the narrative arc of your personal statement on what is relevant to your proposal. From [General Instructions for NIH and Other PHS Agencies](#), include: “aspects of your training; your previous experimental work on this specific topic or related topics; your technical expertise; your collaborators or scientific environment; and/or your past performance in this or related fields.” No need to list research not related to the application. Same goes for awards and honors.
- Carefully choose publications for your bibliography that highlight your team’s and your expertise, your particular qualification to do the work you propose, and your level of productivity.
- If you know of potential concerns about your work that a reviewer may raise while reading your proposal, you may be able to use the biosketch as an opportunity to put those questions to rest.
- Take the NIH up on its instruction to include imminent promotions. While no particular titles are required, your status may affect how your qualifications are viewed by reviewers.
- Ask colleagues, mentors, and friends to read it (well) before submission and provide feedback. The biosketch could be the “first impression” you’re making on members of the scientific community.

Biosketches are required for some progress reports too, so it’s incumbent upon everyone to have a strong one that is up-to-date and ready.

### GENERAL

#### CLAGS: Center for LGBTQ Studies Fellowship Award

Deadline: June 1, 2019

"An award to be given annually for a graduate student, an academic, or an independent scholar for work on a dissertation, a first book manuscript,

or a second book manuscript. The CLAGS Fellowship is open to intellectuals contributing to the field of LGBTQ studies. Intended to give the scholar the most help possible in furthering their work, the fellowship will be able to be used for research, travel, or writing support." <<more>>

#### Vilcek Foundation Prizes for Creative Promise

Deadline: June 10, 2019

"The Vilcek Prizes for Creative Promise were established in 2009 as a complement to the Vilcek Prizes, to encourage and support young immigrants who have already demonstrated exceptional achievements, and who often face significant challenges early in their careers. As with the Vilcek Prizes, the Creative Promise Prizes are awarded annually in biomedical science and in a changing category of the arts, next year recognizing accomplishments in the field of architecture.... 2020 Applications will be in Biomedical Science and Literature" <<more>>

#### Columbia Alliance Joint Projects

Deadline: June 21, 2019

"The Alliance Call for Joint Projects is open to full-time officers of instruction of professorial rank, from all disciplines at Columbia University, École Polytechnique, Sciences Po, and Paris Panthéon-Sorbonne University. Projects must be presented jointly by at least one faculty member from Columbia University and one faculty member from any one of the three French institutions. Third parties may be part of the Joint Project team as long as the team includes at least one faculty member from Columbia University and at least one faculty member from any one of the three French institutions. The Alliance Program will fund projects up to \$15,000 for travel, materials, technological support, and other expenses in the design/implementation of the project. The grant cannot be used for salary, stipends, Per Diem, or teaching-assistant wages. Special consideration will be given to those projects which aim to

promote sustainable relationships between departments or schools in the Alliance network.”

### **Hagley Museum and Library Henry Berlin Du Pont Research Grants and Exploratory Research Grants**

Deadline: June 30, 2019

"Administered by the Center for the History of Business, Technology and Society, Hagley invites serious researchers to apply for one of our grants to defray the costs of an extended stay intended to use our collections. All grants require applicants to explain how their project will contribute new information to previous scholarship and how Hagley's research materials are pertinent to their project. Exploratory grants are limited to one week and Henry Belin du Pont research grants may be up to 8 weeks. Researchers who first apply for an exploratory grant may ask for a longer research grant if our collections warrant more attention. Anyone can apply for one of these research grants, but only advanced graduate students are eligible for our Henry Belin du Pont dissertation grant and the Jefferson Scholars/Hagley Library fellowship. Scholars with a Ph.D. may also apply for a four- or eight-month NEH-Hagley Postdoctoral Fellowship." [<<more>>](#)

### **Humboldt Foundation Research Fellowship for Experienced Researchers**

Deadline: Rolling

"Submit an application if you are a researcher from abroad with above average qualifications, completed your doctorate less than twelve years ago, already have your own research profile and are working at least at the level of Assistant Professor or Junior Research Group Leader or have a record of several years of independent academic work. A Humboldt Research Fellowship for experienced researchers allows you to carry out long-term research (6-18 months) in Germany. Applicants choose their own topic of research and their academic host. The fellowship is flexible and can be divided up into as many as three stays

within three years. Scientists and scholars of all nationalities and disciplines may apply to the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation online at any time." [<<more>>](#)

### **Hedgebrook Writers in Residence**

Deadline: June 1, 2019

"Hedgebrook is on Whidbey Island, about thirty-five miles northwest of Seattle. Situated on 48-acres of forest and meadow facing Puget Sound, with a view of Mount Rainier, the retreat hosts writers from all over the world for residencies of two to six weeks, at no cost to the writer. Six writers are in residence at a time, each housed in a handcrafted cottage. They spend their days in solitude – writing, reading, taking walks in the woods on the property or on nearby Double Bluff beach. In the evenings, they gather in the farmhouse kitchen to share a home-cooked gourmet meal, their work, their process and their stories. The Writers in Residence Program is Hedgebrook's core program, supporting the fully-funded residencies of approximately 40 writers at the retreat each year." [<<more>>](#)

### **National Science Foundation Antarctic Writers and Artists Program**

Deadlines: June 1, 2019

"The Antarctic Artists and Writers Program was established to facilitate writing and artistic projects designed to increase the public's understanding and appreciation of the Antarctic and human endeavors on the southernmost continent. The Artist and Writers Program gives priority to projects that focus on interpreting and representing the scientific activities being conducted in the unique Antarctic region. Proposed projects must target audiences in the U.S. and be distributed/exhibited in the U.S. The program does not support site installations or performances in Antarctica. The program also does not support short-term projects that are essentially journalistic in nature (See Section IX.

Other Information). Artists and Writers Program field teams should consist of no more than one or two people. Larger projects—such as television or documentary film crews—should contact the cognizant AAW Program Officer." <<more>>

### **University of Minnesota**

#### **Michal G. Karni Scholarship**

Deadline: June 1, 2019

"The Michael G. Karni Scholarship supports visiting professors, lecturers, or graduate students from the United States or abroad using the archival sources of the University of Minnesota's Immigration History Research Center Archives (IHRC Archives), with first preference on projects using the Finnish American collection and second preference on project using the Baltic collections (i.e., Estonian, Latvian, Lithuanian)." <<more>>

### **Gerda Henkel Stiftung**

#### **General Research Grants**

Deadline: June 12, 2019

"The focus of promotion is on the historical humanities, and in particular the support of research projects in the disciplines of archeology, historical science, historical Islamic studies, art history, legal history, prehistory and history of science. In the area of general research funding, it is possible to apply for research projects and research fellowships. An application is possible regardless of the nationality of the applicant and the place of employment. For a number of years, the Foundation has also increasingly addressed issues of great relevance to contemporary life and the future, above all as part of its special Islam, the Modern Nation State and Transnational Movements and Security, Society and the State programmes." <<more>>

#### **Logan Nonfiction Fellowship**

Deadline: June 15, 2019

"Logan Nonfiction fellows at the Carey Institute are provided all the necessary tools to complete their critical work. Lodging, work space, sophisticated

technological support (including Wi-Fi, a state-of-the-art screening room and dedicated space, equipment and software for video, film and radio editing) and meals are provided. Fellows may also benefit from the mentorship of several board members and internationally renowned journalists. We also help selected print fellows convert their work into audio, video or digital media through the expertise of our partners. The Institute is eager to convene issue-oriented conferences related to our fellows' projects to bring their reporting to policy-makers and other experts." <<more>>

Deadline: June 15, 2019

"The largest international artists' and writers' residency program in the United States. Our mission is to provide studio residencies in an inclusive, international community, honoring creative work as the communication of spirit through form." "We offer over 120 fellowships per year to artists and writers of outstanding talent. A fellowship covers the full cost of a VSC residency (some awards also include an additional stipend for travel/lost income/etc). At each of our three annual deadlines (February 15th, June 15th, and October 1st), our fellowship offerings change. In addition to some donor-driven awards with special eligibility requirements, there are always a number of general, merit-based VSC fellowships for which all applicants are considered." <<more>>

These applications should be for small, self-contained research projects, such as those that involve single investigators. Of particular interest are projects that propose normative or conceptual analyses, including focused legal, economic, philosophical, anthropological, or historical analyses of new or emerging issues. This mechanism can also be used for the collection of preliminary data and the secondary analysis of existing data." <<more>>

**Smith Richardson Foundation Strategy and Policy Fellows**
