Featured Funders

New York Community Trust

It's hard to find a single punchy story about today's Featured Funder, [The New York Community Trust](#). That's mostly because of the nature of community foundations—by definition, they're communal projects and don't really have one eccentric millionaire or ill-gotten fortune behind them to spin into a juicy narrative. Even when they have famous funders attached, they're really legal mechanisms for pooling resources to improve the lives of those living in a particular area.

Case in point, the first community foundation was started in Cleveland by the mostly forgotten lawyer, Frederick H. Goff. The Cleveland Foundation has a [webpage](#) insisting that Goff was "A National Intellectual Treasure," based largely on his role in 1914 in convincing the Cleveland Trust Board to create the Cleveland Foundation. He might have been an intellectual treasure but credit for the idea of pooling resources for charitable purposes probably belongs to whatever cavewoman first found herself surveying some newly minted orphans whose parents had just been gored by a wooly mammoth. Goff's real innovation was formalizing community foundations, giving them firm legal footing with a charter, endowment, and a formal mission to improve the lives of community members. And that's really what community foundations are today—charitable grant-making institutions, run by a local board that solicits donations from within the community and funds projects that better the area.

The New York Community Trust formed a decade after the Cleveland Foundation, when eleven banks decided to combine their resources. The first award given was a \$20 teaching award funded by Rosebel G. Schiff, who donated \$1,000 (\$16,000 today) in memory of her favorite teacher. New York City community members kept adding to NYCT for the next few years, including [Laura Spelman Rockefeller's](#) heirs, who added her \$2.5 million fortune to NYCT after her death. But the real innovation for NYCT came in 1931, when it set up the nation's first Donor Advised Fund (DAF).

When a donor contributes to a DAF, he or she adds her funds to a wider pool and relinquishes control over donations. He or she can advise the fund manager about what causes to support (hence the name), but it's not binding. There are reasons why people prefer to give to DAFs, rather than foundations—less overhead, no required annual distribution, anonymity—but given that you can't apply, they're not much help for research funding. But they're a big part of the philanthropic market today and have been used to fund (I assume) some of the NYCT's notable philanthropic pushes, like funding for AIDS activism, 9/11 relief, and, most recently, support for organizations during COVID.

Today the NYCT splits its funding opportunities among the aforementioned DAFs, targeted [Requests for Proposals](#), and a more general grantmaking program that you can apply to on a rolling basis by [submitting a proposal](#), not to exceed ten pages, a budget, a letter of institutional support, a list of Board members, and a copy of your annual operating budget. Biomedical Research: "Program Goals: Help early- and mid-career researchers start projects and gather data needed to apply for larger government or private grants. Primarily support research projects for cancer, heart disease, and incurable diseases."

Promising Futures: "Helping young people prosper; providing job training and placement; making our educational and justice systems work for everyone; alleviating hunger and homelessness; improving family and child welfare services; and advancing the practice of social work."

Thriving Communities: "We make grants to groups that protect and create affordable housing, promote equity in the arts, improve civic engagement, and protect our environment. We support agencies working on these issues at the neighborhood level. "

Sage Advice

Tiny Disasters

The other day we received an email on a listserv we belong to from a Sponsored Research officer at another college. A faculty member had submitted an application for a 5:00 PM deadline at 5:00:59 PM. The government portal had accepted it at the time of submission and they all breathed a sigh of relief. Three weeks later, they got an email from the Program Officer telling them the proposal had been late and was therefore disqualified. This story kicked off a lively discussion among the other Sponsored Research officers on the thread, with everyone sharing a different horror story. It made me think that some of our newer faculty might not fully realize all the reasons it's important to submit proposals to our office with *at least* a day or two of lead time—*especially* when submitting to the notoriously complicated federal agencies. It's not about being polite or about being a good colleague. It's because **there are a number of small issues that you might miss in your application and if we don't have time to review them, it is very possible that Research.gov might spit out your proposal without letting us submit it.** So let's talk about these tiny disasters in waiting and what you can do to avoid them!

NSF Current and Pending Support (CPS) Document:

You forgot to include the current proposal as pending in your CPS document.

Your project title, dates, and/or amount requested don't match what's in the proposal.

NSF Biosketch

You included too many examples of related activities.

You or your collaborator altered the formatting of the fillable form. (We recommend generating biosketch and current and pending forms through SciENCv).

NSF Project Description

You included hyperlinks in your project description. (We have [a whole article](#) on this here.)

You forgot to include Results from Prior NSF Support for PI and Co-PIs, which has the potential to be an enormous mess, because now you have to frantically add it while trying to keep the proposal under the page limit. Definitely don't do that with twenty minutes to spare!

NSF Collaborators and Other Affiliations (COA)

You used the wrong version of the COA template and it simply won't upload.

NSF Project Summary

You are missing "Broader impact" and "Intellectual Merit" sections and headers.

NSF References

You used "et al." That's fine for NSF biosketches and for the NIH, but not for NSF references.

NIH Effort

"Each Senior/Key Person listed must include effort of value > 0 in calendar months, or academic and summer months. It's okay to put 0 dollars (no salary), but NOT 0 effort."

NIH File Format

Your file name exceeds 50 characters and uses special characters OTHER THAN letters, numbers, underscores, hyphens, spaces, or periods.

You included headers or footers.

You left password protection on your files.

General Formatting Issues.

You have the wrong margins.

You have the wrong font size.

You have to adjust tables or figures.

Do these details all seem picayune and impossible to remember? Good news! There's a whole office to help you with them—but only if you get your application in with enough time to properly review them.

The History of American Philanthropy

“When the legislator has regulated the law of inheritance, he may rest from his labor,” Alexis de Tocqueville observed in [Democracy in America](#). “When framed in a particular manner, this law unites, draws together, and vests property and power in a few hands: its tendency is clearly aristocratic. On opposite principles... it divides, distributes, and disperses both property and power.”

De Tocqueville published *Democracy in America* in 1835 and from his perspective the young United States was a grand and successful experiment in creating an equal society precisely because it had junked the old inheritance laws common in England and France that protected an elite wealthy class by stipulating that inheritance passed to the eldest son in the practice of primogeniture. America had opted to divide inheritance equally upon death, which meant that great fortunes were perpetually fragmenting into smaller estates. There couldn't be any permanent dynasties or a static upper class when each fortune unraveled itself every generation like Penelope at her loom.

Up until now, we've mostly talked about the religious conflicts between the North American colonial needs and British charitable law, which was largely written with an eye toward limiting how much money and wealth the Church could acquire. In the eighteenth century the colonies and Britain continued to drift apart on their attitudes toward charitable—especially religious—bequests. 150 years after Henry VIII ordered the dissolution of the monasteries, the question of religion in England still wasn't completely settled. James II had inherited the throne from his brother Charles II in 1685 and reigned as a Catholic monarch until he was chased out in the [Glorious Revolution of 1688](#). And while William and Mary, and their successor, Anne, were all good Protestants, there was still a lingering fear of another backsliding Catholic monarch. Worries about the church's power only grew sharper in 1704 when Parliament passed a law called [“Queen Anne's Bounty,”](#) which provided funds to augment the salaries of poor parish clergy. To skeptical nobles it looked like Anne, daughter of the Catholic James II, was funneling more money to the Church, setting it up to become again an important domestic power.

Parliament fretted about the problem and in [1736](#) eventually passed a new set of [mortmain laws](#) to restricting charitable gifts to those deeded in the presence of two witnesses at least twelve months before the grantor's death. The colonies mostly ignored these restrictions. Virginia even went so far as to declare in a legal decision in 1743 that the new mortmain laws didn't apply to them because the 1736 law hadn't specifically mentioned the colonies.

Tocqueville is right, though, that there was a deeper shift going on in colonial attitudes toward inheritance and property rights, to something more individualistic and less focused on preserving family fortunes. While [British legislators were grandstanding](#) about the growing evil of “liberty of granting or devising all sorts of land estates by will, and even upon death-bed... to the disappointment and disherison of a man's natural and lawful heirs,” the various North American colonies were slowly changing their inheritance practices. At first the change was subtle. Inheritances under English law had been divided between realty (land, essentially) and personalty (cash). Primogeniture meant that all the realty went to the eldest son, while the personalty was divided among the widow and the other children. However, cash was hard to come by in the colonies, so most colonies started allowing families to parcel out land to all the children. Sometimes the eldest son received a double share of realty compared to the others, but the practice of giving it all to one child declined.

Of course, land was plentiful because the colonists were regularly violating all their treaties with local indigenous groups and taking land that rightfully wasn't theirs. Colonists could dissolve large estates and leave enough for each child to live because there was a whole continent of people to displace and land to plunder. That's the reality behind the inheritance laws that de Tocqueville admired.
