New Opportunities from the National Endowment for the Humanities

It has been a few years since our newsletter has covered the National Endowment for the Humanities (started in 1965 by Lyndon Johnson, in case you were wondering) and I thought it might be a good time to publicize some of the newer and less widely known initiatives. Most people know about the NEH's [Fellowships](#) (**Funding:** Up to \$60k. **Deadline:** April 13, 2022) and [Summer Stipends](#) (**Funding:** \$6k. **Deadline:** September 21, 2022), but the NEH offers a number of curricular awards, as well as tailored fellowships and support for libraries. Check out these options below.

[Humanities Connections](#) “support innovative curricular approaches that foster partnerships among humanities faculty and their counterparts in the social and natural sciences and in pre-service or professional programs (such as business, engineering, health sciences, law, computer science, and other technology-driven fields), in order to encourage and develop new integrative learning opportunities for students.” **Funding:** Up to \$150k. **Deadline:** TBA. Previously September 14, 2021.

“[Humanities Initiatives at Colleges and Universities](#) strengthen the teaching and study of the humanities ... by developing new humanities programs, resources (including those in digital format), or courses, or by enhancing existing ones. Projects must be organized around a core topic or set of themes drawn from such areas of study in the humanities as history, philosophy, religion, literature, and composition and writing skills.” **Funding:** Up to \$150k. **Deadline:** May 19, 2022.

“[The Preservation and Access Education and Training program](#) supports the development of knowledge and skills among professionals responsible for preserving and establishing access to humanities collections... Awards support projects that prepare the next generation of preservation professionals, as well as projects that introduce heritage practitioners to new information and advances in preservation and access practices.” **Funding:** Up to \$350,000. **Deadline:** March 18, 2022.

“[The Archaeological and Ethnographic Field Research program](#) makes awards to institutions and organizations conducting empirical field research to answer significant questions in the humanities... Projects may be led by individuals with institutional affiliation or by teams of collaborating scholars from the same or multiple eligible institutions. Awards provide up to three years of support for fieldwork and data processing.” **Funding:** Up to \$150,000. **Deadline:** September 28, 2022.

“[The Dynamic Language Infrastructure – Documenting Endangered Languages \(DLI-DEL\) Fellowships](#) are offered as part of a joint, multi-year funding program of NEH and the National Science Foundation (NSF) to develop and advance scientific and scholarly knowledge concerning endangered human languages.” **Funding:** Up to \$60k. **Deadline:** September 14, 2022.

“[The Dialogues on the Experience of War program](#) supports the study and discussion of important humanities sources about war, in the belief that these sources can help U.S. military veterans and others think more deeply about the issues raised by war and military service. Project teams should include humanities scholars, military veterans, and individuals with relevant experience.” **Funding:** Up to \$100k. **Deadline:** TBA. Previously October 14, 2021.

“[The Digital Projects for the Public program](#) supports projects that interpret and analyze humanities content in primarily digital platforms and formats, such as websites, mobile applications and tours, interactive touch screens and kiosks, games, and virtual environments.” **Funding:** Up to \$400k. **Deadline:** June 8, 2022.

Sage Advice

Who Counts as a Humanist, Anyway?

Once when I was a postdoc at Princeton, one of the faculty members remarked to me, “Oh, but this is a great year on the market for you. There are a ton of religion and social science jobs.” To say that I was taken aback would be an understatement. Reader, my degree is in philosophy of religion. *I studied dead Germans who made up myths about the birth of God.* Long dead guys who just sat down in their studies, sharpened their quills, and thought, “eh, I bet this is the nature of the Absolute,” and went from there. Sure, *they* often thought that they were being rigorously scientific, but they also believed in phrenology, the idea that women passively absorbed information like plants absorb sunlight, and the possibility of communicating with the dead—not to mention that at least one of them was withholding judgment on whether or not there were human populations with tails. I don’t know what sort of flimflam his colleagues were feeding him, but my field was decidedly not a social science.

But the broader question of who counts as a social scientist and who counts as a humanist is a complicated one, especially for the purposes of grant applications. Just because you are in a traditional social science department, like economics or political science, doesn’t mean that you are automatically disqualified from applying to fellowships meant for humanists. To figure out if you might be eligible, your best bet is to look at the standard definition of the humanities, [established by the NEH](#) and used by funders like the ACLS and Mellon Foundation.

“According to the 1965 National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities Act, ‘The term ‘humanities’ includes, but is not limited to, the study of the following: language, both modern and classical; linguistics; literature; history; jurisprudence; philosophy; archaeology; comparative religion; ethics; the history, criticism and theory of the arts; those aspects of the social sciences which have humanistic content and employ humanistic methods; and the study and application of the humanities to the human environment with particular attention to reflecting our diverse heritage, traditions, and history and to the relevance of the humanities to the current conditions of national life.’”

[Elsewhere](#), the NEH notes, “Applications must clearly articulate a project’s value to humanities scholars, general audiences, or both.”

The key language here is **“those aspects of the social sciences which have humanistic content and employ humanistic methods.”** So what might that include?

- *History of economics, history of science, history of architecture—you get the idea.
- *Relatedly, anything that involves archival work, oral history, or ethnography.
- *Philological work. Are you tracing the evolution of a concept or a word? That counts.
- *Analysis of material culture, like art, music, performance, etc.
- *Broadly, anything you might consider qualitative, rather than quantitative analysis.

Your project doesn’t need to consist *entirely* of humanistic methods, but you should be able to make a good case that it’s a substantial part of your project. If you’re applying for something like the NEH Summer Stipend, it might be helpful to propose to work on the part of your project that most closely aligns with humanistic methods and questions during your weeks on the grant.

You can also make the case for the humanistic relevance of your work by talking about humanistic questions or frameworks. There are plenty of frameworks to choose from—affect theory, material culture, gender studies, and so on. You do have to show your work, though; if you want to claim that you are in conversation with humanists, you have to talk about and cite specific writers in your proposal. If all this seems like too much of a stretch, you might not be a fit and that’s fine. But don’t rule yourself out without thinking about it!

The History of American Philanthropy

Imagine this: It's 1783 and you've just defeated one of the major world powers in a war that dragged on for the better part of a decade. You're finally an independent country, free to make your own treaties with foreign powers, set your own taxes, and write your own laws. The foreign troops withdraw, your army can go home, and you can settle down to ruling a country.

What laws do you use?

Up until now, I've been telling the story of the history of philanthropy in the North American colonies—[what religious beliefs the colonist brought to the continent](#), how their [views on inheritance](#) and philanthropy grew out of their [complicated relationship to colonialism](#), and the ways that they sometimes accepted, [sometimes resisted the British charitable laws](#) they inherited. The fault lines had been clear enough. The colonists were largely less likely to challenge charitable bequests than English courts, partly because they needed those gifts to establish social services and partly because, as a population heavily mixed with religious dissenters, they just didn't worry as much about funneling too much money to the Church in the way King and Parliament had for centuries. There was no singular "Church" capable of monopolizing all the land and revenue, just a conglomeration of distinct churches.

But having a different culture around philanthropy is very different from having a different set of laws, and there are all sorts of practical concerns that arise when you really think about starting a new country from scratch. Should you scrap the old laws and start over with new ones? If so, what laws do you use while you're in the middle of drafting new ones? People don't stop dying and leaving complicated wills for their heirs to sort out just because you're trying to rethink the legal code. And what do you turn to when looking for legal precedent? Can you still use the cases decided under the old system?

Compounding the problem was the broader question of how centralized the government would be. Especially during the early years of the Articles of Confederation, the question of legal codes was largely left to the states. Massachusetts, along with New Jersey, Virginia, Delaware, South Carolina, New Hampshire, and New York all published laws or added riders to their state constitutions allowing British law to continue but insisting that the legislature could overturn laws as it saw fit.

No one was exactly happy with this solution. It was messy, ad hoc, and inconsistent. It meant that you could get different legal rulings on inheritances, depending on the state where you lived and died, though half the time you wouldn't be able to know how inconsistent your ruling was, because it might take *years to publish legal rulings. Just think of it—a handful of decentralized courts trying to build a national legal tradition in a time when news traveled on horseback.*

Still, states did the best they could to retain what worked and jettison what didn't. But all their best efforts never quite quelled the grumbling that it was impossible to build a republic on the basis of aristocratic laws. Thomas Jefferson came to believe that all laws should be rewritten every two decades. [As he wrote to James Madison:](#)

No society can make a perpetual constitution, or even a perpetual law. The earth belongs always to the living generation. They may manage it then, and what proceeds from it, as they please, during their usufruct. They are masters too of their own persons, and consequently may govern them as they please. But persons and property make the sum of the objects of government. The constitution and the laws of their predecessors extinguished then in their natural course with those who gave them being. This could preserve that being till it ceased to be itself, and no longer. Every constitution then, and every law, naturally expires at the end of 19 years. If it be enforced longer, it is an act of force, and not of right.

The confusion of precedent and the fear that British laws were incompatible with American culture would only continue to grow, taking particular force in the run-up to the war of 1812.

Your Project Titles Matter, Choose Wisely

“Project titles matter because they partially determine who will end up reviewing your proposals. Unlike the situation with journals, where an editor can share the abstract of a manuscript with a potential reviewer, all NSF can share is the title. This comes into play in two important ways:

“First, when we put together a panel, we strive to find panelists with a broad diversity of interests to cover the broad diversity of proposal topics in a typical panel. A major challenge is to figure out the best matches of panelist expertise with proposal topics. To help in doing so, we send each panelist a complete list of proposal titles and ask them to rank each from 1 (“I’d love to review this one and have the necessary expertise”) to 4 (“I’m clueless or disinterested”). Although we sometimes overrule those rankings, we certainly pay attention to them. Here’s the point: If you want your proposal to be reviewed by someone who can best appreciate your project and provide the most constructive feedback, your title is pivotal. Make sure it concisely summarizes what your proposal is about and stay away from vague or grand statements.

“Second, the same challenge of matching reviewers to proposals comes into play when Program Officers solicit reviews from ad hoc reviewers (i.e., reviewers who are not panelists).”

More Data on Applications Submitted During the Pandemic

“The vast majority of applications were Type 1s during this cycle, but overall there was a 2 percent decrease in the number of R01-equivalent applications submitted this year compared to last. The percentage of applications from men only has decreased, and from women only has remained relatively stable. The percentage of multi-PI applications with men and women increased. As it relates to race, the proportion of applications with white only investigators decreased, went up for applications where multiple investigators with different races were identified (mixed), and held relatively steady for Asians and underrepresented minorities (URMs). The latter group includes black/African Americans, Pacific Islanders, and American Indians, and though their percentage remained relatively stable, they still made up a small fraction of the larger applicant pool.” [<<more>>](#)

New Financial Assistance Transparency Reporting Requirements (OMB M-22-02)

“The Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA), as amended by the Digital Accountability and Transparency Act (DATA Act), requires the Federal Government to increase the availability, accuracy, and usefulness of online information regarding Federal spending. Specifically, it requires Federal agencies to link and report disparate and historically siloed budget, financial, and award-related Federal data in an easily searchable, downloadable, uniform, and consistent display to the public. Over the past several years, successful implementation of the DATA Act enabled for the first time a more

Few foundations give groups they support decision-making power on funding priorities

“Eighty-three percent of large U.S. [foundations seek input](#) from some of the nonprofits they fund – along with other people, organizations or communities directly affected by [their funding](#). But foundations, which aim to serve the public interest through the money they give away, rarely give [these stakeholders](#) decision-making authority – by either letting them help set priorities or giving them a say about where grant money flows. That is what philanthropy scholars [Kelly Husted](#), [David Suarez](#) and I found in a study that assessed the [practices](#) of the 500 largest U.S. foundations. Our findings suggest that foundations, which face mounting pressure to direct more [grants to underserved communities](#) as part of the widespread [reckoning on race](#) underway in America, have incorporated some stakeholder outreach into their work.” [<<more>>](#)
