Resources for a CAREER Award Application

It's almost July, which means it's [CAREER](#) Award season at the Sponsored Research Office. Those of you in the weeds hardly need an introduction to the National Science Foundation's CAREER Awards, but for those of you who are curious or wonder if you might be eligible for it, I'm going to start with a brief overview before suggesting some resources.

The CAREER Award is the most prestigious award offered to pre-tenure faculty by the NSF. It was started in 1995 as the merger of a few different programs, meant to encourage early career research and educational activities. Each CAREER Award covers five years of funding and is meant to support early career faculty who "have the potential to serve as academic role models in research and education and to lead advances in the mission of their department or organization. Activities pursued by early-career faculty should build a firm foundation for a lifetime of leadership in integrating education and research." **The current Deadline is July 27, 2022.**

Who is eligible?

According to the NSF's website, applicants must:

- "Hold a doctoral degree in a field supported by NSF;
- "Be engaged in research in an area of science, engineering, or education supported by NSF;
- "Hold at least a 50% tenure-track (or tenure-track-equivalent) position as an assistant professor;
- "Be untenured; and
- "Have not previously received a CAREER award. (Prior or concurrent Federal support for other types of awards for non-duplicative research does not preclude eligibility.)"

Faculty may only apply three times for a CAREER Award.

The eligible Directorates include: the Directorate for Biological Sciences; Directorate for Computer and Information Science and Engineering; Directorate for Education and Human Resource; Directorate for Engineering; Directorate for Geosciences; Directorate for Mathematical and Physical Sciences; Directorate for Social, Behavioral and Economic Sciences; Office of Integrative Activities; Office of International Science and Engineering; Directorate for Technology, Innovation and Partnerships.

Sage Advice

Institutional Grants: What They Are and How You Can Get Involved

If you've met with us before or [have been reading for a while](#), you've probably heard us talk about institutional grants—that is, projects that might span departments or even institutions, and include events such as curricular initiatives, exhibitions, conferences, community engagement projects, or the like. It's pretty unusual for early-career faculty to spend much time thinking about institutional projects, because you're normally (rightly!) focused on your research, but after tenure, you might find yourself with more bandwidth and interest. So let's talk today about how you might get involved.

Option 1: You come to us with a project that you want help funding.

This happens regularly. In the past year alone, we've worked with faculty on an opera, an international consortium for scholars of Caribbean Digital Scholarship, funding to the integration of sustainability and climate issues into the curriculum, and preliminary funding to create a global catalog of Zines. These projects were all generated independently by faculty or staff.

Option 2: There's a pre-existing College program that you want to get involved with.

We have a number of well-established programs, like [Barnard Engages, \(SP\)²](#), or [the Beckman Scholars Program](#). Most of these programs involve mentoring undergraduates while also doing administrative work around interviewing new applicants, keeping an eye on the funds, providing information that our office can use for reports to donors, or, occasionally, assessing the success of the program.

It can really vary how you get involved.

- If the program is already well-established in a department, then you might hear from the faculty member running it. This, for example, is the case when it comes to the Beckman Scholars Program; there's a certain set of departments that can be involved, based on the funder's guidelines. We are given a list of eligible applicants by departmental chairs and gather necessary documentation, but it's the Program Manager (also a faculty member) who makes the necessary decisions.
- Sometimes we or the Provost's Office will invite faculty members to get involved. For example, watch for an RFP in the fall to get involved with Barnard Engages.
- You can contact us. We tend to be the ones who write reports on institutional programs like this, so odds are good that we know the key players to put you in touch with.

Option 3: We run across an RFP that might fit College needs.

This can also work in one of two ways.

- If we know that you're working on a particular project and see an opportunity that's relevant, we'll send it to you. That's why it always helps to keep us in the loop!
- If there's something that fits College priorities and that you might be a good lead for, the Provost might approach you.

What can the Institutional Funding team do to help?

We can look for funding options at any stage of the project. We also regularly give feedback on grant drafts, review the budget, and offer suggestions on how to handle communication with funders. Our office runs interference with more technical issues, like establishing what sort of paperwork Finance needed to transfer funds internationally, making suggestions on the best way to structure payments for very small organizations, and providing numbers for things like per diem for conference travel, course release, and summer salary. And if there's something else that you need, just ask!

The History of American Philanthropy

[Last month](#), we discussed the start of “scientific philanthropy,” telling the story of [Josephine Shaw Lowell](#), an ardent anti-imperialist, an advocate for philanthropic works that fixed the underlying issues in a society, rather than helping the destitute at the moment they collapsed into misery, and a founder of the “New York State Custodial Asylum for Feeble-Minded Women,” which was specifically designed to prevent “feeble-minded” women from reproducing. There’s more to say about eugenics and philanthropy and we will get to it in time. First, I want to spend a little more time talking about the other forms of philanthropy available at the time, specifically the community organizations that so many of the big foundations reacted against.

To take one such community as a case study, Lila Corwin Berman, Professor of History at Temple University, published in 2020 a book called [The American Jewish Philanthropic Complex](#). The book begins with the nineteenth century, during a high moment of Jewish immigration to the United States. According to Corwin Berman’s account, most early Jewish philanthropic societies were mutual aid societies of one form or another—some national, some local, some organized by profession or country of origin.

One of the earliest was B’nai B’rith, which was founded in 1843 in New York City by a group of Jewish men originally from the German states. [The organization allowed members to pool their resources to support each other’s widows and children in case of an untimely death](#), giving widows \$30 for funeral expenses, a weekly \$1 stipend for the rest of their lives, along with the promise to raise their male children in a trade. B’nai B’rith also doubled as a fraternal organization for Jewish men excluded from masonic lodges, with secret rituals and initiation ceremonies in local “lodges.”

As immigration from Eastern Europe continued to climb, B’nai B’rith expanded its scope and mission. [In 1851](#), it founded in New York City the first Jewish Community Center, which is also widely considered the first Jewish library in America, and following the Civil War, it created a Jewish orphanage in Cleveland. It also pioneered disaster relief, launching after a flood ravaged Baltimore in 1868 (which was also thirteen years before the Red Cross was formed). B’nai B’rith grew so rapidly that it soon started to lose its masonic character and in 1898 the ladies’ auxiliary was formed.

Women were active in the early years of Jewish mutual aid societies, often holding leadership positions, managing budgets, and even running stand-alone organizations. As nearly a quarter of Jews belonged to some form of mutual aid group or philanthropic organization by the early twentieth century, this gave women a substantial public role.

That role began to decline almost as it peaked. Early in the twentieth century, (predominantly male) Jewish leaders began to survey their philanthropic landscape and came to the same conclusion as the proponents of scientific philanthropy: This patchwork of local organizations was too slipshod to be effective. It sometimes offered duplicative services where they weren’t needed, while leaving other groups suffering from genuine need with no help at all. Leaders began to experiment with forms of coordination and consolidation, the most successful of which, according to Corwin Berman, was the “federation” model.

A federation of charities would centralize “the collection and allocation of capital within any given community,” in Corwin Berman’s words. Organizations would no longer have to compete with each other for fundraising dollars, but resources would stay local enough to meet community needs. It was a neat solution, albeit one that tended to push women out of philanthropy as the men in charge decided which organizations deserved resources and which didn’t. It was also a prescient one, as you can see [today foundations more and more often collaborating](#) to meet unprecedented demands caused by issues like COVID, urban blight, and racism.

The EPA is Getting Rid of Its Online Archive and Groups Are Unhappy

U.S. universities fight Senate innovation bill targeting foreign gifts to faculty

“Attention all research faculty and staff: That birthday present from your uncle in France must be reported to the office of sponsored research. And, by the way, the details may become public.

“Senior research administrators at nearly 500 U.S. colleges and universities could find themselves writing such memos if Congress retains a requirement for reporting individual gifts from foreign sources that is included in a Senate version of a massive innovation bill now being negotiated by lawmakers. But higher education lobbyists, alarmed at the administrative burden and the chilling effect the provision might have on all international collaborations, are waging a last-minute fight to prevent that from happening.

“The Senate provision, which has gone almost unnoticed, would require universities to collect information on “any gifts received from a foreign source [by] faculty, professional staff, and others engaged in research.” The information would go into a “searchable database” the institution must create and maintain; institutions that violate the rules would be subject to fines of up to \$50,000. The provision applies to any U.S. institution

receiving more than \$5 million a year in federal research funding.” [<<more>>](#)

“Arbitrarily walling off a sizable percentage of a science agency’s budget from a sizable majority of the country’s research institutions would fundamentally reduce the entire nation’s scientific capacity,’ 18 senators and 78 members of the House of Representatives warned in a letter opposing the Senate plan that was released last week. NSF would be forced to shrink existing programs, they say, a move that would hurt many less research-intensive institutions located outside of have-not states. There are better ways to address the current geographic imbalance, they add.” [<<more>>](#)

Elsa U. Pardee Foundation Grants

“The Elsa U. Pardee Foundation funds research to investigators in United States non-profit

institutions proposing research directed toward identifying new treatments or cures for cancer. The Foundation funds projects for a one-year period which will allow the establishment of capabilities of new cancer researchers or new cancer approaches by established cancer researchers. It is anticipated that this early-stage funding by the Foundation may lead to subsequent and expanded support using government agency funding. Project relevance to cancer detection, treatment, or cure should be clearly identified. By design, there are no limits set on the grant amount that can be requested. It must be reasonable and clearly supported by the scope of the project outlined in the application. Applications requesting more than 5% overhead are usually not considered. Papers verifying nonprofit status and relevant human subject and experimental animal treatment approvals from the recipient institution will be requested prior to project initiation. A final report summarizing financial expenditure and research achievement is required.” [<<more>>](#)
